4. INTRODUCTION

Background

Rescue Widows, Elderly, Youth and Orphans with AIDS (RWEYOWA) officially opened its doors in May 2006. Seven dedicated volunteers involved in the door-to-door housing and population census of 2002 established RWEYOWA after realizing the need to respond to HIV/AIDS and its devastating effects in the community. In its first decade, RWEYOWA has grown from just a small community based organization in Namasuba into an influential non-governmental organization operating in Wakiso and Kampala districts.

RWEYOWA is dedicated to activities and campaigns designed to reduce the further spread of HIV/AIDS and improve the livelihood of those affected/infected with HIV/AIDS in the community.

RWEYOWA's core strength lies in its excellent understanding of the community it serves and

its practical approach of finding solutions to problems within the community. This strength

is derived from the fact that many of its staff members themselves come from the same vulnerable groups that RWEYOWA targets.

Mission

To curb the further spread of HIV and improve the livelihoods of those affected/ infected with the virus in the community.

Vision

A community accessing HIV/AIDS prevention, care and support services in the most prosperous and sustainable way possible.

Objectives

- To establish care and support activities/projects to improve the lives of those affected/infected with HIV/AIDS
- To prevent the further spread of HIV/AIDS and STDs among people of all ages through the ABC strategy
- To promote sexual reproductive health among young people in the community
- To advocate for equality, respect, and protection of all those infected /affected by HIV/AIDS
- To improve coordination and cooperation with other partner organizations through mobilization, information sharing, and expertise in the struggle against HIV/AIDS.

5. 10 years of making a difference

The priority HIV program activities implemented at RWEYOWA in its first decade are informed by the best available scientific evidence in HIV research findings by RWEYOWA and various partners that have maximum impact on reducing new HIV infections and save/improve the quality of lives of persons affected/infected with virus in the community. RWEYOWA's programs have distinct approaches which are in line with the key national strategic frameworks; National HIV and AIDS Strategic Plan, Health Sector Strategic and Investment Plan, Health Sector HIV / AIDS Strategic Plan and the National HIV Prevention Plan.

HIV prevention has continued to take more emphasis in RWEYOWA's effort to respond to HIV/AIDS in the community. During the course of this past decade, RWEYOWA carried out HIV/AIDS prevention and care/support interventions with the aim of further reducing the spread of the virus and improving the livelihoods of those affected by the virus in the community.

Activities that were implemented include among others: Comprehensive HIV/AIDS Sensitization/Education, HIV Counseling and Testing, Orphan Support/Sponsorship, Empowerment and Economic Development, Community Outreach, Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission of HIV (PMTCT) and Family Planning.

5.1. HIV/AIDS Sensitization/Education

As one of the critical and proven efforts to prevent new HIV infections, RWEYOWA conducted its comprehensive HIV/AIDS sensitization program among its clients, school communities, and the general public. HIV/AIDS sensitization/education was used to save people from contracting the virus, as well as addressing stigma and discrimination against People Living With HIV/AIDS (PLHIV), which are fueled by misunderstandings and misinformation.

The HIV/AIDS sensitization and education activities depended on the audience. Among the young school-going communities, emphasis was put on abstinence as the best means to prevent the sexual transmission of HIV. Discussion groups were conducted, and HIV/AIDS reading materials were also distributed among young people in schools to equip them with comprehensive HIV/AIDS prevention knowledge and skills.

As far as HIV/AIDS sensitization/education among PLHIV and the general public is concerned, condomuse, faithfulness, safe male circumcision, HIV/AIDS treatment adherence, discordance, and gender-based violence among PLHIV were our main areas of interest.

During these past 10 years, RWEYOWA's HIV/AIDS sensitization/education reached 23,504 school going young people and at least 28,472 people out of school. Conducting discussion groups, staging drama shows and distribution of HIV/AIDS Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials were the main approaches used to carry out HIV/AIDS sensitization/education activities. Lots of thanks to Straight Talk Foundation for providing RWEYOWA with reading materials (Information, Education and Communication materials) about young people/youth and HIV/AIDS prevention.

5.2. HIV Counseling and Testing Outreach (HCT)

In all our endeavors, RWEYOWA emphasizes that the only true way to know your HIV status is to get tested for HIV on a routine basis (every 3 months). We have been able to facilitate this process for our community during the past 10 years by conducting outreaches to provide voluntary counseling and testing services.

This service promotes behavioral change in case of HIV negative results, whereas once tested and found positive, individuals can then receive support from RWEYOWA's outreach services and referrals to partner health centers/hospitals for free HIV/AIDS treatment services.

168 HCT outreaches were conducted during our first decade of HIV/AIDS community service, and at least 20,864 people were able to know their HIV status.

5.3. Orphan Support/Sponsorship

We strongly believe that "Education is the best gift to a vulnerable child" RWEYOWA's Orphan Support/Sponsorship has been one of the most cherished and far reaching intervention in our effort to improve the livelihood of vulnerable children orphaned by HIV/AIDS in the community. Lots of thanks to the efforts of our dedicated sponsors, RWEYOWA has been successful in setting up regular sponsorship for 97 vulnerable orphans. Of these, 19 have international sponsors and are given strict and comprehensive care to keep them healthy, happy, and ready to learn. Others (78) are under the scholarship/bursary scheme established by RWEYOWA with local schools in the community. We're proud to note that some of the children we started with under this program (Namuli Erinah and Iradukunda Yvonne) are now at the university!



5.4. Community Outreach

Since RWEYOWA's inception in 2006, we been been providing trusted, life-saving support services to our clients throughout Wakiso and Kampala districts.

RWEYOWA makes weekly visits to the people affected/infected with HIV/AIDS under our care in order to provide routine health checks for opportunistic infections, assistance with necessary medications, and imperative psychosocial support and counseling for the PHA and the families that care for them. Additionally, we provide these clients with stocks of basic necessities such as foodstuffs, clean water and clothing



5.5. Family Empowerment and Economic Development (FEED) Project

The "FEED project" has been considered as the RWEYOWA's project of the decade. It was the most sustainable and life-changing project implemented during the past 10 years under review. With a mission of facilitating the economic independence of some of the vulnerable individuals and families affected/infected with HIV/AIDS in the community, RWEYOWA designed this project to provide some of our vulnerable clients with the basic capital necessary to earn an income at home by tending small livestock that do not require intensive care. Selected clients/families were given choice of either chicken or piglets to raise, based upon their personal interests and capabilities.

The FEED project started with 14 families during the implementation year 2010/2011 as a pilot project, and it has expanded to benefit a total of 73 families. These home-based sources of food and income empowered clients to take an active role in their own welfare by overcoming the costs of capital investment and allowing them to immediately reap the benefits of a small business venture. The proceeds from these "businesses" provided these families with a degree of financial independence they desperately needed. Rieti Gengo (one of RWEYOWA past volunteers) was the brains behind this RWEYOWA's best project of the decade.

6. CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

6.1. International Volunteer Placement

RWEYOWA hosted international volunteers in the endeavor to enhance the human resource capacity of the organization, as well as facilitating cross-cultural exchange and eliciting new organizational ideas.

This ensured a competent and knowledgeable human resource base needed to deliver effective HIV/AIDS prevention, care and support services.

None of the RWEYOWA's achievements would have been possible without the intelligence, creativity and commitment of our tremendously talented volunteers.

Special thanks to our overseas country representatives/coordinators who have continued to work with RWEYOWA from their respective countries.

My reason for volunteering with RWEYOWA was quite different from most. My reasons were simply to share a volunteer experience with my daughter, Alena, and to see, first hand what it is that she is pursuing as her career in international public health.

What I received was much more than that. To see the inner workings of a small locally run organization was an eye opener. The organization, determination, strength and compassion these young men have for their community is something to be admired.

Flexibility and adaptability are good strengths to bring along as every day with them is different. I helped organize and work at VCTs (Voluntary Counseling and Testing), and walked many miles to take food and medicine to community members. Part of my time was spent on Project Restore RWEYOWA, which enabled me to utilize my strengths as a craftswoman. By the time we were done, we had painted, patched and upholstered everything in the office. It felt good to give these young men the office they so deserve, as the work they do is important and necessary for the health of their community.

To work with such compassionate, humble and capable men has been life changing. To volunteer with RWEYOWA is one of the most rewarding endeavors in my life.


